The analysis of the study focused on the effectiveness of storytelling in enhancing language skills. Key methods used include:


- Qualitative Analysis: Examined interview and survey data to identify common themes and insights related to storytelling's impact.

The study revealed the following key findings:


• Improvement in Speech Fluency: Children exposed to regular storytelling sessions exhibited noticeable improvements in speech fluency.
